

# Population and Health Care Expenditure in the ASEAN Region








### The Cambodian health care system (I)

- Public and private hospitals with both non-profit and for-profit business models
  - Public sector: most preventive services and inpatient (stationär) care
  - Private sector: provides mostly outpatient (ambulant) curative consultations, accounts for 67-78 % of primary care consultations in urban areas
  - Private facilities are the first point of contact for most Cambodians
  - Trust issues: preferred treatment abroad (Vietnam, Thailand, Singapore)











### The Cambodian health care system (II)

- Foreign investors have begun to set up hospitals & medical centers with foreign staff
- Drugs / medical equipment supplied by European, American or Japanese companies
- Smaller private health providers across the country (in 2015: ca. 8,500)
- Ca. 200 NGOs active in the sector as direct service providers & local staff trainers








# **Total Health Care Expenditure (THE)**

- Out-of-pocket payments: > 60 % of THE
- Lowest government share amongst CLMV
- COVID-19: Overall government budget cut
- Goal: universal health coverage by 2025
- Reliance on foreign donors
- Health Equity Fund (selected free services)
- National Social Security Fund (NSSF)
- Health Strategic Plan 2021–2030 TBP

# **Laws and Regulations**

ullet Department of Drugs and Food (DDF) under Ministry of Health  $\P$ 



- Selling / importing drugs requires company license via CamPORS from Ministry of Health. New drug registration: 12-month process
- Medical equipment: harmonized medical device regulations with ASEAN
- Operational framework for medical product distributors and manufacturers
  - 1) Set up a local company (can be 100 % foreign-owned) with MoC, obtain pharmaceutical import company license from the MoH
  - 2) Work with local company with pharmaceutical import company license
- Ownership and licensing of a private health facility









#### **Challenges**

- Lack of universal health coverage, financial risks for patients
- Public health care quality: often underfunded, understaffed, undersupplied
- Technology barrier: Medical devices & ICT
- Maternal and child mortality, neonatal mortality
- Strong urban / rural divide, malnutrition in rural areas
- Increase in cardiovascular diseases, diabetes, cancer and respiratory diseases
- Counterfeit and unlicensed products, esp. pharmaceuticals
- Pollution-based deaths and illnesses
- Overuse of antibiotics, multidrug resistance

### **Business opportunities (I) – Pharmaceuticals / Health supplements**

#### **Pharmaceuticals**

- Rising demand (e.g. in Insulin) due to increasing non-communicable diseases (diabetes, cancer, cardiovascular disease)
- Increasing wealth and lower poverty levels, expanded customer base

### **Health supplements / Nutritional products**

- Growing consumer health awareness, increasing demand
- Supplements sold by pharmacies, supermarkets, gyms and minimarts
- Additional 1,400 health supplements were registered 2008-2018
- → High trust in German/EU pharmaceuticals & supplements, prioritized by private and public hospitals and consumers

### **Business opportunities (II) – Medical equipment**

#### **Growing market:**

- Medical device imports have doubled between 2015 and 2020 alone
- Between 2008-2018, imports of medical X-ray machines increased by 162 %
- Newly established private hospitals boost demand for quality equipment
- Government funds to purchase medical devices for public hospitals
- Government's strategy: reduce the gap between the public/private sector
- Result: Several recent public tenders focusing on in-vitro diagnostic devices and medical imaging devices










# **Business opportunities (II) – Medical equipment**

### **Business opportunities (III) – Trainings**

- Shortage of skilled health care workers
- Demand for training services, including TVET, e.g. through:
- Partnering with local universities to train doctors and nurses
- Partnering with German development cooperation through support programs
- Establishing TVET institutes for medical and laboratory technicians & biomedical engineers, supplying workforce to
  - operate private diagnostic centers and laboratories
  - operate, maintain and repair imported medical machinery

### Business opportunities (IV) - Opening a modern hospital

- International hospitals are operating successfully in Cambodia
- Domestic medical treatment / consultation on non-communicable diseases
- Specific lifestyle treatments (e.g. anti-aging) for new middle class
- Trust in quality as key factor (origin of medical equipment and supplies)

### **Sector Brief Overview**



#### **Business opportunities (V) – Health Insurance**

- Total value of insurance policies 2011: USD 30 million, 2019: USD 100 million
- Value of Cambodia's private health insurance premium market: from USD 6.8 million (2014) to USD 18.6 million (2019)
- Health insurance not negatively impacted by COVID-19
- Int'l corporations and organizations provide / contribute towards employee health insurance, local companies follow suit to attract skilled labor









### **Business opportunities (VI) – Further opportunities**

- Public Tenders by the Cambodian government (contributions by World Bank, ADB)
  - construction of health infrastructure
  - supply of pharmaceuticals, medical equipment and devices
  - improved water and sanitation, child health, education and training
- Dentistry in Cambodia has a good reputation
  - "dental tourism" to Cambodia (20-30 % cheaper treatment fees than Thailand)
  - specialized medical tourism agencies have opened
  - domestic dental patient market also increasing

#### What develoPPP can do for you

- Financial or technical support, up to 2 million € funding, max.
  50% public contribution for:
- Sustainable pilot investments when business interests match with development objectives
- German / European companies, companies in developing / emerging countries can apply four times a year
- Criteria: 800K EUR annual turnover, at least 8 employees,
  ≥ 2 operative business years









<u>develoPPP</u>	Senior Experten Service	DEG
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#### Offer of the SES

- SES has more than 12,000 experts with expertise in more than 50 sectors of industry who provide advice and hands-on support nearly all around the world
- Their volunteer assignments usually last 3 - 6 weeks; max. duration: 6 months
- Assignment preparation, project handling costs, insurance paid by SES
- Local expenses & international travel to be paid for by applicants (<u>link</u>)

- Up-Scaling Programme (financing of early-stage SMEs, scaling innovative business models)




